WGO Suva Training Center The latest updates

The first WGO-ANZGITA Train the Endoscopy Trainers course held in Suva, 24th to 25th of July 2024.

The inaugural Train the Endoscopy Trainers course for the Pacific region was held at the Colonial War Memorial Hospital in Suva over two days in July 2024.

The course dovetailed the end of the monthlong ANZGITA-supported Endoscopy Training Course which is held annually at this venue.

Six endoscopy trainers of widely varying experience came from across the Pacific region, with a mixture of physician and surgical endoscopists from Fiji, Vanuatu, Palau, Samoa, and Tonga.

The chief convener was Associate Professor Russell Walmsley from Auckland, New Zealand with local faculty assistance from Dr Mai Ling Perman, co-director WGO Fiji training centre.

The learning objectives of the course were to:

- acquire specific endoscopy room teaching skills
- gain exposure to adult educational concepts
- develop critical reflection skills regarding teaching and clinical practice
- discuss assessment, measurement and development tools in endoscopy.

The 1st day consisted of educational theory and practical skills learning techniques with scenarios based around the Walmsley Endoscopy Training Box and candidates presenting small teaching vignettes. The development of reflective feedback was encouraged, and specific tutorials aimed to equipe these potential, and experienced, trainers with a workable Framework of Training to put in place in their home endoscopy units.

During the 2nd day the trainers took turns in teaching one of the ANZGITA Endoscopy Course Trainees, while a second Trainer analysed the teaching episode using the Reflective Feedback techniques learned about on the first day. The remaining candidates watched the teaching interaction via audio-visual link from the theatre allowing 'on the fly' reflection and discussion, learning from each other's experiences.

Very positive feedback from the first set of Endoscopy Trainers to attend such a course was a result of all the hard work of the staff and faculty at the WGO Suva Training Centre to help create a convivial learning environment, despite some challenging technical difficulties.

We hope and expect to be able to build on this foundation to repeat a Train the Endoscopy Trainers course again in 2026.



A Year of Growth in Gastroenterology Training

In October 2023, five fellows—Dr. Yassir, Dr. Mulongo, Dr. Farida, Dr. Pabari, and Dr. Ijaa—joined the Gastroenterology training program. It's hard to believe it's already been over a year! The journey so far has been an interesting blend of hands-on learning, patient care, and once-in-a-lifetime experiences.

Learning the Art and Science of Gastroenterology

Over the past year, all trainees have been busy learning the ropes of endoscopy, starting with basic upper and lower GI endoscopy and progressing to therapeutic procedures. The trainers—Prof. Ogutu, Dr. Lee, Dr. Onyango, and Dr. Ngugi have been patient and consistent guides, pushing us to grow while providing constant support, said Dr. Sajni Pabari.

Aside from the technical skills, we've been deeply involved in patient care, managing cases in the gastroenterology wards, and running the liver and GI clinics. Each week, we also set aside time to work on our research projects, which has been a great way to explore our individual interests within the field, said Dr. Pabari.

As the year progressed, we gained confidence and began performing therapeutic procedures, such as:

- Fixing PEG tubes.
- Managing upper GI bleeding (both variceal and non-variceal).
- Placing esophageal stents.
- Performing polypectomies

It's been rewarding to see our progress and feel more equipped to handle these complex cases.

EUS Training Workshop:

We were lucky to have an EUS workshop led by our very own Prof. Ogutu and Dr. Prakash, along with visiting faculty Dr. Sundeep and Dr. Vinay (India). We had an opportunity to learn the basics to be introduced to advanced techniques like pancreatic biopsies, fluid collection drainage, and palliative gastrojejunostomies.




Colonoscopy Training

An Unforgettable Experience in Japan




Kenyan doctors mark the end of 1-month observership in Kyushu University, Japan
